"What is District 4?" - by Todd T., Growth Committee Chair

"An AA district is a geographical unit containing the right number of groups – right in terms of the committee member's ability to keep in frequent touch with them, learn their problems, and find ways to contribute to their growth and well-being. The number of groups per district varies widely, from as few as five in a rural district to 90 or more in a metropolitan district."1

Our District has 45 registered and active groups hosting a combined 110 meetings each week! In addition, there are at least 6 meetings not associated with a registered group. Geographically, our District includes meetings in Great Falls, Reston, Herndon, and Sterling. Of our 45 groups, 35 have elected a Group Service Representative (GSR) to communicate and inform the group conscious at monthly District Committee meetings and Virginia Area Assemblies twice per year. District meetings are on the third Wednesday of each month at St Anne's Church and are open to all A.A. members.

"The Twelve Traditions make clear the principle that A.A., as such, should never be organized, that there are no bosses and no government in A.A. Yet at the same time, the Traditions recognize the need for some kind of organization to carry the message in ways that are impossible for the local groups."2

Our District Committee is led by 4 elected officers – The District Committee Member (DCM), Alternate DCM (ACDM), Secretary, and Treasurer. Our District has 8 sub-committees charged with performing district tasks, critical to carrying the message to the suffering alcoholic – Intergroup Liaison, Workshops, Newsletter/Website, Grapevine, Growth, Cooperation with the Professional Community / Public Information, Mailing Lists, and Archives. Based on contributions from groups in the district, we have a modest budget to support the work of our committees, fund officer travel to assemblies, and encourage district fellowship and unity.

The District needs your contributions of time and talent to help carry the message to the still suffering alcoholic. Those who volunteer for the District Committee describe unique rewards from their general service work. They experience an intense sense of contribution to A.A. unity through their efforts, small and large; and they develop deep relationships with A.A. members that they would normally not meet, benefiting from the incredible experience, strength, and hope of the A.A. community at large.

District 4 - Committee Mission and Quarterly Highlights

Growth

Last quarter, the Growth Committee focused on encouraging Group Service Representative (GSR) selection and involvement. While Tradition 4 says that "Each group should be autonomous," it goes on to add "except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole." GSRs are charged with transmitting ideas, opinions, and facts so that each group becomes a part of "the collective conscious of our whole fellowship," placing our common welfare first, to keep our fellowship united. "For on A.A. unity depend our lives, and the lives of those to come." Of our District's 45 active groups, 35 have a GSR (77%). So, get to know your GSR and ask about what goes on at District meetings or Virginia Area Assemblies – perhaps you will find it interesting, have an opinion to pass on, or even sign up to be the next GSR for your home group!

Archives

Building a Digital Archive

In an effort to bring the Dulles district archives into the internet age, the Archives committee is in the process of giving our records a digital makeover. District meeting documents, reports and proposals, as well as event flyers, group histories, and information on our ever-evolving meetings are being digitized and compiled into an interactive database to more easily search, sort, and learn from the history of Alcoholics Anonymous in the Dulles district. For preservation purposes, the original physical copies of our archives will be compiled for long term storage at the VAC Archives office in Waynesboro, Virginia, but the digital catalog will be kept locally, and will be accessible by request through our archives committee.

Group Histories

Our district consists of more than 60 individual groups--many of which hold multiple meetings per week. In an effort to keep a record of how our district's groups have evolved, and continue to do so, we're setting our sights on updating our collection of group histories and stories. We encourage all groups to submit a Group History for our records. You can submit your group's history and story by following the link provided on the District 4 website. A printable copy of the form is also available on the district website. Copies of all group histories submitted to the district will be forwarded to both the Virginia Area Archives and the Northern Virginia Intergroup Archives.

New Virginia Area AA History Book and Group Histories

The Virginia Area Archives is currently in the process of writing a new history book for us! This new book, *Sharing Our Common Wealth*, will include excerpts of submitted group histories from across Virginia. It's hoped that the book will be completed and ready for publishing within the next few months. Aiming to be representative of all groups, the VA Archives has requested that as many groups as possible submit a story-form historical write-up to be included.

Cooperation with the Professional Community, CPC

Holding true to our primary purpose the Cooperation with the Professional Community (C.P.C.) has continued to be one of our great assets in carrying the A.A. message to the still-suffering alcoholic. Our purpose is to inform professionals and future professionals about A.A. — what we are, where we are, what we can do, and what we cannot do. Through this medium, District 4 helps establish a stronger sense of trust, communication and cooperating with our community.

Since last quarter we have carried the message to a hospital, a major university and a shelter all here in Northern Virginia. Additionally, we have 13 literature racks placed in establishments in the area.

Treatment Facilities - Hospitals and Institutions

The purpose of a Treatment Committee is to coordinate the work of individual AA members and groups who are interested in carrying our message of recovery to alcoholics in treatment and outpatient setting and to set up means of "bridging the gap" from the facility to an AA group in the individual's community.

Treatment service work requires a minimum of 1-year of sobriety to lead or chair.

The district is in need of female volunteers to help with this important work. A team of experienced members are available at the Stepping Stones to help guide you along.

Intergroup

The Northern Virginia Intergroup (NVI) is a service resource maintained by more than 400 Alcoholic Anonymous groups in our area. Our primary purpose is to help the alcoholic who still suffers. NVI works with the groups in the area to help carry the message. To accomplish this, the Northern Virginia Intergroup (NVI):

- Provides 24-hour telephone contact for AA information.
- Maintains a schedule of AA meetings in the area which lists more than 800 meetings a week.
- Stocks Conference approved literature for groups and individuals to purchase.
- Stocks Sobriety Chips for groups and individuals to purchase.
- Maintains a list of members willing to do 12th step work, such as give rides, talk, and provide temporary sponsorship.



Grapevine September Issue Young & Sober






Grapevine's Audio Project-A Service You Should Know About
